FROM THE TRACTOR CAB

It's been called the wettest dry harvest, as many combines stood idle as the cereal moisture was too high to combine, and if combined would need to be dried to be able to sell. Grain should be at 15% or lower, otherwise it could be rejected by the buyer. Although it did not rain, there was very little sun or dry wind to dry the crop. From the seat of the combine you can see the tracks the deer have made and the circles they have made to sleep in. There are the remains of 'kills' of fox and buzzard. Sometimes a hare or deer will suddenly jump up from directly in front of the machine before leaping away. As the nights draw in, the bats are out hunting earlier to build their body weight to survive the winter, the swifts and swallows leave our shores to make their way to southern Africa. Which is a feature in itself but even more fantastic to me is that some moths and butterflies also undertake that journey. At the end of the Countryside Evening, as dusk descended, the Beck Valley sounded more like a Harry Potter scene as Tawny owls called to each other. Now the combine has finished its job for another year the fields will be transformed, like turning a page to drill for next year's harvest

Ben would always have a bright, cheeky smile and his enthusiasm for all things practical was expressed in many engineering projects. We went on a few long journeys together as I helped him collect motorbikes he'd bought to improve and sell on at a profit. He certainly had the mark of an ntrepreneur about him even at that age.

While this is a story of tragic circumstances it is also one of some superb friendships and alliegences. Many of Ben's workmates and friends have rallied round to continue turning Ben's dream into reality. Some words from Ben's mates to his family read, "if there's anything you need we've got you... The BD Boys". That sums up the depth of feeling and true friendship which Ben engendered. A week ago I drove out from home and saw Ben's Mum and Dad on the flat roof of the Buck removing old sheeting and timbers. Both have thrown every effort and hour into completing the task of refurbishment. Their single aim is to ensure that Ben's little family have the security he was trying to create for them.

I've no doubt that there'll be many, many tears for Ben over the next weeks, months and years. I'm also pretty sure that there'll also be tears of joy at completing the refurbishment and returning Ben's Buck to his little family and the village. Ben would be so proud of his parents, his family and his friends for all their efforts.
