# Village Meeting

On the 16th May the second village meeting was held at the Buck . Lin

Smith thanked everyone who had decided to get more involved in improving the village . There is currently one resident trained to cover Community Support Group work with a further 3 awaiting training . Latest update is that getting suitable availability dates seem to be delaying further training .

Options for improvement work were discussed and further proposals for these works will come out to those who have offered to help . Hedge/shrub work in Church Rd and also the junction of Church Road and The Street were identified plus the clearance of The Street's pavement . Most of this work has now been completed , although tidying up the area around and behind the old telephone kiosk may be another task to consider at the next Village Meeting .

Regarding flooding, there had been another inspection in Abbey Road, near the farmhouse and it may well be that there is a mix of problems with the moat being overgrown but also that its banks toward the roadside field may have eroded, allowing excess water to overspill along the concrete track and down into Abbey Road. We just need to make contact with the landowner, have a good look and set up a working party to try and improve things.

The Aviation Museum was discussed , including possible planned works/proposals but nothing could be confirmed without real knowledge of those plans or without a Museum representative . A watching brief is all that can happen for now . The negative affect of the 2023 East Coast Pirates car club approach was also reviewed . Recent events gave an indication of more consideration being applied by the Museum toward the Buck , so it's hoped that this is a sign of improved relations .

# The Street Dyke

The dyke along The Street is well overgrown and there is some concern that the vegetation will eventually collapse into the stream , raising the height of the river bed . Latest feedback is that the Environment Agency intend clearing the dyke this coming Autumn .
